an important literary and philosophical figure georges bataille has had a significant influence on other french writers such as foucault derrida and baudrillard the thirst for annihilation is the first book in english to respond to bataille s writings in no way though is nick land s book an attempt to appropriate bataille s writings to a secular intelligibility or to compromise with the aridity of academic discourse rather it is written as a communion theoretical issues in philosophy sociology psychodynamics politics and poetry are discussed but only as stepping stones into the deep water of textual sacrifice where words pass over into the broken voice of death cultural modernity is diagnosed down to its kantian bedrock with its transcendental philosophy of the object but bataille s writings cut violently across this tightly disciplined reading to reveal the strong underlying currents that bear us towards chaos and dissolution the violent impulse to escape the thirst for annihilation

ranging from freud to sade this far reaching and controversial study of the underlying sexual basis of religion and philosophy especially in relation to death includes the results of research into taboo religious ecstacy and the erotic impulse

until his death in 1962 bataille was an instrumental force in philosophical debate acting as a foil for both surrealism and existentialism and advocating radical views that spanned the entire spectrum of political thought stuart kendall chronicles these aspects of his intellectual development as well as tracing his pivotal role in the creation of journals such as documents and acéphale and how his writings in aesthetics and art history were the pioneering cornerstones of visual culture studies kendall positions bataille at the heart of a prodigious community of thinkers including andré breton michel leiris jean paul sartre alexandre kojève jacques lacan and maurice blanchot among many others

georges bataille 1897 1962 was an essayist poet novelist and philosopher of excess his philosophy emerges from the aesthetic avant garde of the 1920s and 30s when he was associated with the surrealist movement and has since been explored by the major figures of poststructuralism and postmodernism his classic works include the story of the eye and the accursed share on nietzsche takes up nietzschean thought where nietzsche left off with the death of god written against the backdrop of germany under the third reich the book explores the possibility of a spiritual life outside religion in so doing it weaves an astonishing tapestry of confession theology philosophy myth and eroticism all shot through with the images of war translated by bruce boone introduced by sylvère lotringer

the tears of eros is the culmination of georges bataille s inquiries into the relationship between violence and the sacred taking up such figures as giles de rais erzebet bathory the marquis de sade el greco gustave moreau andre breton voodoo practitioners and chinese torture victims bataille reveals their common obsession death this essay illustrated with artwork from every era was developed out of ideas explored in erotism death and sexuality and prehistoric painting lascaux or the birth of art in it bataille examines death the little death that follows sexual climax the proximate death in sadomasochistic practices and death as part of religious ritual and sacrifice georges bataille was born in billom france in 1897 he was a librarian by profession also a philosopher novelist and critic he was founder of the college of sociology in 1959 bataille began the tears of eros and it was completed in 1961 his final work bataille died in 1962

this is the first collected english translation of bataille s poems bataille s poetry is definitely the poetry of a philosopher but it is also a poetry with an obsessively erotic often scatological edge frequently pushing the boundary of what is or isn t obscene bataille believed that everything relates to the workings of desire and death in sexuality but he also believed that poetry was the product of hate and other extreme emotions just as much as erotic pleasure accedes to self annihilation but bataille was interested in actual action not just disengaged hypothesis concerning the sexual act dufour editions is pleased to bring bataille s poetry to print in english this is the audacious frightful side of surrealism library journal bataille produced some of the most transcendent pointedly filthy literature of the

century and these poems together in english for the first time are no exception publishers weekly

in his critique of georges bataille s inner experience sartre claims that the experience of nonknowing rejects every concept that allows designation and classification bataille 2004 p 169 but ultimately fails he claims that with the phrases nothing night and a nonknowing that lays bare he has simply presented us with a fine little pantheistic ecstasy pp 170 2 bataille does not disagree with sartre s claims writing that he accurately analyzes my mental state and as i should point out objectively and clearly dissects this state going so far as to acknowledge that sartre manages to uncover the workings of my mind underscoring the foolishness of its workings better from the outside that i could from the inside p 170 i was moved p 170 bataille tells us and concedes that i ve myself observed these inextricable difficulties to which sartre refers my thinking and its workings took these very difficulties as their starting point though this was like a landscape glimpsed from a speeding train

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
